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Biography Greville Corbett is a member of the Surrey Morphology Group. Research interests My research attempts to bring together the remarkable variation we find across languages with the sense that they are deeply similar. I have three broad areas of interest:

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For example, in Cushitic languages, general number can be the same as singular number for some nouns, but the same as plural number for other nouns (e.g. in Arbore, a Cushitic language spoken in Ethiopia, general number may contrast with the singular in the absence of a distinct plural form; see Corbett 2000:17-18 for examples and discussion ...

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The personal pronouns 'I' and 'you (singular)' take gender agreements corresponding to the gender of the speaker or addressee: male humans trigger gender I agreement, female humans - gender II agreement, and imaginary locutors of genders III and IV (e.g. a speaking cow and a speaking goat kid) trigger gender III and IV agreements, respectively.

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110 GREVILLE G. CORBET Within this, we need further terms to discuss the "elements" involved. We call the element which determines the agreement the controller. The element whose form is determined by agreement is the target. The syntactic environment in which agreement occurs is the domain of agreement.

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UNIVERSALS AND FEATURES Greville G. Agreement in language relates to the correspondence between words in a sentence, in terms of gender, case, person, or number. For example, in the sentence 'he runs', the suffix -s 'agrees' with the singular 'he'. Patterns of agreement vary dramatically cross-linguistically, with great diversity in the way it is expressed, and the types of variation permitted.

The definitions given in the sections above correspond to canonical morphosyntactic, morphosemantic, and morphological features. No feature in any language has values which are consistently realised in the permitted ways across all relevant elements.

Corbett Surrey Morphology Group, University of Surrey Linguists use the term "split" in apparently inconsistent ways ("plurality split", "split ergativity" and so on). I argue that the term is actually used relatively consistently, across the various wings of the discipline, and that such splits form an elegant typology.
